Area B Delegates Report

Area delegate report: John Rafferty, Delegate Area B. Hi Area B members, I recently attended the General Service Conference in Sydney over the weekend of 7th to 9th November. The weekend was inspiring for me regarding service, and it was my privilege to present our Areas group's recommendations at the Conference. I enjoyed participating on the weekend and was warmly welcomed by all the other trustees and delegates, new and old. I had been well-prepared for it by attending meetings with other delegates and trustees throughout the year, and I was kept well-informed by the conference members and Sydney's head office, the General Service Office (GSO). There seemed to be more topics this year than usual, so the conference added an extra day compared to previous years. This is going to be the norm now; however, next year the extra day will be on Monday instead of Friday, which will help lower costs. One thing that stood out to me at the conference was the power of the minority voice, as it completely changed one of the outcomes of the topic. Due to the number of topics, I am just going to mention the ones that were accepted. The General Service Conference decided the following.

Topic 4: Safeguarding AA policy document” to be produced as an educational animation

A video safety resource to be produced, taking into account materials already available, such as those from the US Area 93 District, which we watched at the conference. (I am in the working group involved in this project, too.)

Topic 10: Revamping the Australian PI Workbook and publishing it in digital format

A new Australian PI workbook will be created, published in digital format, and made available for free download. (A working group is being formed)

Topic 17: Creation of a national, standard process for the project management of Advisory Actions.

A Working Group of members with professional skills in project management are to help try to create a user-friendly process for project-managing advisory actions based on Concept 11 suggestions.

Topic 18: Creating a new Australian 7th Tradition Flyer

An update to the material in the 'Group Contributions Plan' pamphlet, in combination with relevant information in 'Money and Spirituality', is to be created. To create a simple, readable, online flyer that can be updated regularly and provide groups with inspiration and information to carry out the 7th tradition.

Topic 25: Create a Professional Press Kit

The development and ongoing maintenance of a national standardised press kit is to be created, managed and updated by the GSO. It will be maintained by the GSO and made accessible through the AA Members website, in compliance with AA's legal, branding, and communication standards and reflecting the organisation's core values.

Topic 31: Updating the "AA in Your Community" Pamphlet

The pamphlet "AA in Your Community" is to be updated as per the suggested pamphlet and amended per the Committee's recommendation to change the website link and include a reference to a live chat function.

Topic 34: Developing a Publication for Housebound alcoholics

A working group is to be formed to develop a publication featuring Australian AA members who used online groups to overcome barriers like chronic illness, disability, and caregiving to find fellowship, access to service & get sober.

Topic 38: Corrections AA Sober After Release brochure

The Sober After Release pamphlet is to be produced in addition to the Bridging the Gap pamphlet, and the pamphlet is to refer to aa.org.au. (So both are being produced)

Topic 39: Australian Big Book stories made available online

The Australian story section of the Australian Big Book to be made available online.

Topic 40: Use of AI-Generated Educational Videos to Support Fellowship Awareness and Outreach

The GSO is to produce and publish short, AI-generated educational videos to inform members, newcomers, and the general public about AA's purpose, structure, and principles.

Topic 41: Two-Year, Part-Time Paid Contract for a National IT Coordinator

The General Service Board is to explore options and develop a plan for paid services to ensure the security and continuity of Alcoholics Anonymous Australia's digital assets and online services.

Topic 43: Big Book AUSLAN Translation

A working group has been formed and is looking at the cost of translating it to sign language (I am also part of this working group).

Topic 46: AA Guidelines for General Service – Definition, Purpose and Procedure

The suggested definition, purpose and procedure in relation to Guidelines for General Service should be accepted and implemented.

Topic 47: Office Staff Conference Vote Rotation

A fixed four-year voting term for the General Service Office staff members holding the single staff vote at Conference, with the option of additional non-consecutive terms where no other suitable staff member is available to be implemented. The Service Manual is to be changed to reflect this Advisory Action.

Topic 49: Sunsetting of donation clubs

The Clubs will be discontinued, and their promotion will cease across all AA channels. While existing participants may continue to contribute, no new members are to be invited or encouraged to join.

Topic 52: Publicly Available, Downloadable Searchable Service Literature

The General Service Board is to ensure all AA policy documents, guidelines, service manuals, and pamphlets are made publicly available and downloadable in PDF format on the national website, in a way that allows search engines and AI systems to index and understand our spiritual principles and mutual aid aims.

Topic 53: Removal of the "60:30:10" Plan from Service Literature and Endorsement of the Group Contribution Plan

The General Service Board is to ensure all references to the "60:30:10" plan are removed from AA service literature, and that the Group Contribution Plan be referenced instead. Also, the Board make a clear statement that the "60:30:10" plan is not official nor endorsed by the Board, and that group contributions are a matter for each group's informed group conscience.

Topic 57: Increasing National Convention Seed Money

The Australian National Convention seed money given to the Host Planning Committee (HPC) will be increased from \$10,000 to \$15,771.96, and to keep pace with the consumer price index (CPI).

Topic 63: Professional AA Business Cards

The General Service Conference resolved for the General Service Office to design professional business cards that can be downloaded by the groups and printed as required as opposed to holding hard copies of cards because they would take up space and cost a lot to print if not used, so they can be downloaded and printed as required.

Topic 65: Advisory Action Tracking Platform

The General Service Board is to develop a searchable, online platform hosted on members.aa.org.au to record, track, and report on Advisory Actions and General Service Conference Resolutions.

The finance and GSO reports and board resolutions were conducted towards the end of the General Service Conference, and as discussed last year by the previous Area delegate (Lesley), the fellowship is continuing to maintain financial responsibilities; however, it is still heavily reliant on literature sales for its income and needs to look at ways of becoming more self-sufficient from the 7th tradition and this is not helped due to the increase of digital literature and therefore decline in material sales. There are many working groups (as mentioned in the topics I just spoke about) looking for AA members to join. I have joined the working group for (Topic 4 - safeguarding AA policy document) and (Topic 43 big book AUSLAN translation). The Conference report will be available on the members' website, <https://members.aa.org.au/> and I have seen a lot of other information about the conference already published. Just go to the members' website for viewing. If you want any information about anything that was rejected at the conference or anything about these accepted topics, just ask or send me an email, as I have quite a bit more information on the reasons and how we got to these outcomes.

The Topics form for 2026: is now available, and it is strongly suggested to take the topic through your group, district and area if time is available and try to give costings (which is now available on the new form). This is to provide more and better information, making it easier at the conference and for groups voting on the topics. The cutoff date for topics this year is Friday, the 1st of May. Also, we are looking for an Alternate delegate as I am nearly halfway through my term, and it would be better to have one by the end of this year. If you know anyone willing to take on this role, let them know, and they should have five years of sobriety.

He reminded us that Australia had help when starting AA and that in some of these countries, it is much harder for people, as resources are limited, and they have much greater financial constraints and political issues, and this money gets directed to helping them carry the message to the still suffering alcoholics in these countries, where there are some very encouraging stories. In closing, submitting the Area B Conference report has been a truly encouraging experience. It is clear that a significant amount of service work is being carried out across all our districts, from workshops and events to the vital reopening of prison and rehab meetings. Through my research and conversations with members, I've realised I have likely captured only a fraction of the incredible effort underway. It is inspiring to see how we are collectively assisting the path for the next alcoholic seeking sobriety.

ABC Spearwood Steps Group

GSR report for Thursday, 7:00 pm to 8:00 pm (ABC Spearwood Steps Group).

The group numbers are between 8 - 12 members per week. The group takes in between \$30 to \$50 per week and donates monthly to the 50:30:10:10 plan (Approx \$150 per month) and will continue to make regular donations when the funds are available. This is down a bit due to lower numbers of people, and some don't bring cash. We have a small prudent reserve for coffee, literature when needed and other expenses. Most of our service positions are filled (treasurer, secretary, GSR and smaller roles such as greeter).

We occasionally get newcomers to our meeting, and they are always given a beginner's pack and some phone numbers (men for men and women for women) when they first arrive, and we also encourage sponsorship. We purchased a 12 Concepts for World Service banner at our meeting to promote the notion of service in AA.

The group has six home group members, with most having service positions. Two are new home group members. We have members ranging from 40 years of sobriety to newcomers at the meeting, and there is a good atmosphere. All in all, the meeting is well attended, and the group is going strong.

ATTENDANCE

We have very good numbers ranging from 8 – 25, (sometimes more). The vibrancy and enthusiasm of the group continues to impress newcomers and people quickly volunteer for service positions, as soon as they are able. The positions of Secretary/chairperson is rotated on a 14 week basis. The position of Treasurer is a 2 year role.

MEETING FORMAT

For the last fifteen minutes of each meeting, we read out the corresponding Tradition to the Step we are currently reading in the “12 by 12” book. We have found getting to know the traditions enhances our recovery as a group and gives us the “big picture” of the foundation upon which the AA fellowship operates so effectively.

FACILITIES
